Throwing Dirt on Road from Lake to San Francisco.

from Toano, Eko County, to Ely, White Pine County. By this clever plan the Western Pacific makes it possible to get consent from Gould before they get their grade. This being done, the road will be up to the Nevada Northern to meet that crossing.

For Grading and Constructing
160 Yards of New Road.

Sealed bids to be marked on outside of envelope, "Bid for Pinto Road Work," will be received by the Board of County Commissioners of Eureka County, at the Clerk's office, up to

Monday, September 18, 1905,

at 2 o'clock p. m., for the construction and grading of about one hundred and sixty (160) yards of new road, about one-fourth of a mile above the old Pinto Toll House bridge, where the work has been staked out, to connect the road in the Canyon with the road above on the east side of the Canyon, the grading to be of uniform pitch, and to connect at the upper end on a level with the old road. The width of the road to be not less than twelve (12) feet on solid ground, where grading is necessary. The Board will have a man on the ground on September 17th, 1905, between the hours of 2 o'clock p. m. and 4 o'clock p. m. of said day, to point out the work.

on Conditions Here,

The Reno Journal stretched a glad hand to Eureka last Tuesday. The article includes a detailed description of the conditions here as seen through the eye of a well-known and successful Eureka boy, who was a visitor after an absence of two weeks. The Journal article is here reprinted.

For the first time in many years the tax roll in Eureka County has increased. The Assessor has completed his work and the results are published in the SENTINEL. It shows a substantial gain of \$51,000.

Real estate dealers are optimistic and the outlook for a boom is encouraging. The last issue of the SENTINEL shows the effect of the movement by issuing a new edition, four pages of which is devoted to a descriptive article of Eureka County, written by James McCarthy.
